Things to Remember:

- Be there to greet your shearer and assist him/her when needed do not expect the shearer to shear your sheep when you are not there!
- Keep your sheep dry if it rains the day or two before your appointment.
- Have your sheep locked in the barn, or penned up in a small confined area, and ready for shearing.

Have a clean, dry, junk-free area for your shearer to work in.

Help your shearer get the animal from the pen to the shearing matt.

Questions about skirting your fleece?

Ask your shearer about skirting techniques, how to prepare a better fleece, and what to do to participate in the Rhody Warm Blanket Project. Most shearers can give you pointers to keeping the fleeces clean year round - on and off the sheep - before and after shearing.

Bordeaux On The Go!

A major step forward was taken in securing the future of the diversity of the nation's food supply. The first of several tanks filled with genetic samples of rare and endangered livestock breeds made its way from the <u>SVF Foundation</u> in Newport, Rhode Island to the <u>Smithsonian Conservation</u> <u>Biology Institute</u> (SCBI) facility in Front Royal, Virginia. This successful tank transfer is part of the new Smithsonian and SVF Biodiversity Preservation Project, a partnership working to build a national bank of germplasm—semen, embryos, cells, and blood— of a wide variety of rare and endangered breeds of pigs, sheep, goat, and cattle.

This unique collaboration between two world-class conservation efforts was officially launched in summer 2014 by SVF Foundation's founder, Mrs. Dorrance H. Hamilton, and the Smithsonian Secretary, Wayne Clough. The addition of the SVF germplasm collection to the SCBI's extensive animal biorepository represents the first domestic livestock samples to the Smithsonian archives. "<u>The Smithsonian & SVF Foundation Biodiversity Project</u> is a terrific example of how a public and private partnership can address a formidable world challenge," said Clough. "By bringing together the cuttingedge scientific expertise of the Smithsonian Conservation Biology Institute with SVF's extensive genetic material, we will gather more information on rare and endangered heritage breeds to make a lasting impact on global biodiversity."

The tank transfer required precise planning and execution on the part of those involved in the Smithsonian and SVF Biodiversity Preservation Project. SVF's Lab Director Dr. Dorothy Roof, Executive Director, Peter Borden, and the entire SVF crew worked diligently for weeks to ensure a successful tank transfer. The tank, dubbed "Bordeaux", is specially engineered for long-term cryogenic sample storage, and contains over 30,000 units of germplasm that have been carefully collected by SVF Foundation to represent genetic diversity of livestock breeds that may otherwise be lost to extinction. "Bordeaux" weighs in at an impressive 1,400 lbs, and required a custom 64 foot long wooden ramp that was crafted to smoothly load the tank into the cryogenic transport truck. Back-up storage tanks, liquid

nitrogen, and generators were on hand during transport in case of emergency. Cryoport, a professional biological sample transport company, handled the successful delivery and deposit to the SCBI facility.

With this first tank transfer complete, the Smithsonian and SVF Biodiversity Preservation Project plans to complete its mission of collecting and storing samples from endangered domestic livestock over the next seven years. With each deposit into the national germplasm repository, the Smithsonian and SVF Biodiversity Preservation Project comes closer to securing the genetic diversity of irreplaceable domestic livestock breeds for future use.

<u>About the RIVMA</u>: In March 1962, five Rhode Island veterinarians founded the Rhode Island Veterinary Medical Association (RIVMA) as a non-profit organization dedicated to advancing the

science and art of veterinary medicine, including its relationship to public health and agriculture. Today, the RIVMA has grown to a vibrant and active community of more than 200 veterinarians whose dedication to animal welfare reaches beyond their clinic walls. The RIVMA offers several public health services to Rhode Island residents, including: (i) Low-cost rabies clinics that provide vaccines to more than 1,500 Rhode Island pets each year, and (ii) A spay/neuter assistance program (SNAP) that offers low-income pet owners discounted rates on spay or neuter surgeries.

In addition, the RIVMA Companion Animal Foundation (CAF) provides financial assistance to low income pet owners for emergency or routine medical treatment of their companion animals. The RIVMA is also committed to providing quality educational programming. Each December, the RIVMA offers a two-day <u>Scientific Seminar</u> for veterinarians and veterinary support staff. This two-day Continuing Education (CE) opportunity is one of the most popular in the region, bringing more than 400 professionals and 65 exhibitors to Newport, Rhode Island.

<u>New Livestock Welfare & Care Standards</u>: The Livestock Welfare and Care Standards Advisory Council have adopted Livestock Welfare and Care Standards. This document provides minimum care standards for livestock in the state. It will serve as standards for livestock producers and will also define minimum standards of care for law enforcement purposes pursuant to RIGL 4-1. For the third year, the Rhode Island Sheep Cooperative held its Essay Contest to name its next Blanket edition. Last Fall, at its general membership meeting, the Cooperative named Molly Reeves of Manville, Rhode Island, the winner and awarded her a Kindle Fire. Molly is the daughter of Tim and Laura Reeves, and is a member of the Wings N Things 4-H Club. Molly chose to write her essay on the Nooseneck Village, a lost village of West Greenwich. The award was presented to Molly after a delicious Pot Luck Supper and during the Cooperative's formal meeting. The Nooseneck Village Edition of the Rhody Warm Blankets arrived in early December. The Cooperative is extra proud of their Blanket Project as its all



'Made in the USA' and actually starts and finishes here in Rhode Island. The sheep's wool is collected in June in Chepachet, shipped to South Carolina to be washed, then comes back up to Massachusetts for spinning and weaving. The fabric is then shipped to Albany, New York to be washed and fulled, and returned to Woonsocket, Rhode Island, to be napped, cut, edging sewn and packaged. Each edition of the Rhody Warm Blankets has a different name and is of a different pattern, all made in the natural colors of the wool collected that year. This year's pattern was a simple plaid. The Rhode Island Sheep Cooperative is a proud supporter of positive youth development, and besides the Essay Contest, offers an annual scholarship for a member's child

attending college. The Cooperative also supports local 4-H sheep activities, is an annual supporter of the North East Youth Sheep Show held in Massachusetts, and this year is a proud sponsor of the All American Junior Sheep Show. This All American event travels around the country always held on July 4th weekend, last year held in Kansas and this year will be held at the Eastern States Exposition Fairgrounds in Massachusetts. The Cooperative provides educational speakers and programs for its adult members at the spring and fall meetings, and supports the sheep show at the Washington County Fair in Richmond. The Rhode Island Sheep Co-operative is able to support all these activities due to the overwhelming success of the sales of the Rhody Warm Blankets. Plans are in the works for a sheep symposium to be held in February 2016, put on by the Rhode Island Sheep Cooperative. Stay tuned in for more details from the Board!
