Important to Remember:

- ❖ Be there to greet your shearer & assist when needed.
- ❖ Do not expect the shearer to shear your sheep when you are not there!
- * Keep your sheep dry- if it rains the day or two before your shearing date, lock them in the barn to keep them dry.
- On shearing day, have your sheep confined in a barn or small area that is easily accessible. Be time efficient!
- ❖ Have a clean, dry, open area for your shearer to work in.
- ❖ Assist your shearer in moving your animal from the pen to the mat.

Rhode Island Sheep Cooperative Memorial Scholarship

--- AWARD: One- \$1,000.00 Scholarship ---

The Rhode Island Sheep Cooperative Memorial Scholarship is given awarded annually. This scholarship award was created in 2012 in honor and in memory of those members of the Cooperative who have passed on but have "left their mark" in the sheep and/or wool business in Rhode Island:

Lester "Zeke" Young was a long time Cooperative member, Wool Pool Manager, held the office of President many, many times and was extremely generous in his support of our youth activities. Ambrose Garvey was an active member of the Cooperative in his later years, held the office Vice President numerous times, worked on the Rhody Warm Blanket Project from its inception, and encouraged and supported local youth in their sheep projects. Fred & Barbara Andrews were also a long time Cooperative members, Fred held the office of President many, many times, both Fred and Barbara worked closely with 4-H kids and their sheep projects, Fred was sheep show superintendent at the Washington

County Fair for many years and with Barbara by his side help build the sheep show to what it is today. Marcus Thompson had been a member of the Cooperative since the 1950's, served on the Wool Pool Committee, was a 4-H leader in the 50's before stepping down only to start another 4-H club in the early 1970's, was instrumental in the first major addition to the sheep barn at the Foster Fair grounds, supported, promoted and encouraged local youth in sheep projects.

General Information and Qualifications:

- 1. Applicant must be an individual or family paid member of the Rhode Island Sheep Cooperative.
- 2. Applicant should be a graduating high school senior, technical school, undergraduate or graduate college student to apply.
- 3. Applicant must be accepted as an undergraduate or graduate student at a college, university, or technical school.
- 4. Applicant must provide an official current high school or college transcript with application.
- 5. Previous applicants who have not received this award, are eligible to re-apply and will be considered as long as they are attending a school of higher education and remain in good standing.
- 6. Applications must be postmarked by August 1 st of current year. Applicants will be asked for an interview; and interviews will be scheduled after all applications are received. Date and time to be announced.
- 7. The Scholarship winner will be announced during the Open Sheep Show at the Washington County Fair in Richmond, Rhode Island, in August.
- 8. The Scholarship will be awarded in January of following year after applicant sends in an official transcript showing satisfactory performance of fall semester courses (grade average C or better).
- 9. Should the recipient of this Scholarship fail to meet an academic grade point average of C or better in the semester immediately preceding the award, the Scholarship will be forfeited. If this happens, the recipient has the option of applying again the following year without prejudice.

Plans are in the works for the next blanket, collection day will be held either the first or second weekend in June. As you probably know we coordinate our shipping with the Connecticut Sheep Breeders and Worcester County Sheep breeders groups, & all plans have not been finalized at this point. Keep checking our website (calendar page) for the official date and place for the collecting of wool. In the meantime, call your shearer now and book a date for shearing (please note local shears listed on previous pages). Get your sheep sheared before June so that your wool will be ready.

2018 Rhody Warm "Name the Blanket" Contest

Purpose: The purpose of this contest is to choose a name for the next edition of the Rhody Warm Blanket and honoring a Lost Village of Rhode Island.

Rules:

- Open to any Rhode Island <u>youth</u> (18 years old or younger.)
- Entries must be post marked by October 15, 2018.
- All entries shall be submitted in typed form on $8 \frac{1}{2} \times 11$ paper, double space, shall be no less than 250 words and no more than 500 words.
- A cover page with writer's name, address, telephone number, age and email address is required. No report covers, binders or folders will be accepted.
- The winning essay will be used in the commentary describing the Lost Village in the next blanket brochure. Committee reserves the right to edit the winning essay to fit space allowed in the brochure.
- Winning essay writer will be recognized in the blanket brochure.
- Winning essay writer will be notified by phone before being posted on the Rhode Island Sheep Cooperative's website (www.risheep.org), and announced by press releases.
- Winner will receive Kindle Fire and a Lap Throw

Criteria: The contestant shall choose a 'Lost Village' in Rhode Island to write an essay on. Essay shall be no less than 250 words and no more than 500 words and shall include the history of the village, what it was known for (i.e. mill production, stagecoach stop, etc.), and how it became a 'Lost Village'. A 'Lost Village' is considered to be a village that was abandoned, destroyed or is not known to most people today. Contestants should include sources of information (i.e. authors, interviews, title of books, etc.) either by reference within the essay or by footnote.
